



## **Background**

- Joel was the son of Pethuel.
- The name Joel means "Jehovah is God."
- Best date—830 B.C.
- Second in list of the writing prophets.
- Key phrase—"day of the Lord" occurs five times.
- The book begins in gloom; ends in brightness.



#### The Occasion

- Great swarms of locusts invaded the land, bringing destruction with them.
- The locust invasion followed by a drought, then fires.
- God used these difficulties to call His people to repentance!
- Refusal to obey Him would lead to worse judgment armies of other nations against them!
- The people repented; God removed the locusts and sent great blessings upon them.

- They can turn people back to God.
- They can always be times of reflection.

- It must be inward, not just outward.
